Mike, my Danner Pronghorn boots are the best money I've ever spent on my feet, just be prepared to spend the cash and find the ones that fit right... You can always try and make up for insulation with socks as long as the fit is right but it's never quite the same. Mine are uninsulated but my feet get so warm and sweaty that I need to funnel that moisture out of there and keeping them cool helps keep the problem from getting worse. Gortex is a must and your fat ass, sorry but i know you won't be offended, should go for a high boot like the guys recommended because I know I can't carry you out with my lanky arms!

Deryder if you are planning on being away from your base camp for several days, I would suggest a larger pack. As far as getting an elk out with a smaller pack, yes you can. It will take more trips or more people. Also depends on how much of a load you can haul. If you can only carry 70 pounds, then there is no reason to carry a monster pack. Prep. and conditioning is very important. Are you gonna rent ponies? I don't know the rules for Colorado, but you might have to have a guide in wilderness areas... You can't go wrong with the 4500... Make it easy, buy one of each :woohoo: Take care and good luck!

Deryder...I think the 4500 is one of the most popular choices out there for bivy hunting...Iv'e got a new Black's Creek Bone Collector 2.5 heading my way as we speak. It's not quite as big as the 4500 but it's still pretty large at 3100cui. It's an internal frame pack, it'll take a hydration bladder "a must i think", comes with a waterproof cover and orange safety pullout flap...I'll let you know how it is when it shows up, I think retail on these is around \$300, well more like \$275 or so. I gotta steal on mine at \$135 new, I know a guy in Utah who had an overstock on packs and he hooked me up on this one "no he doesnt have anymore". Another low cost option is to pick up a pack frame and just lash everything on to it Take a smaller daypack to use while hunting and if you kill go back and grab the frame to haul meat with. Cabelas has a good pack frame and honestly the old Army "alice" frames work out decent too if you get one with good straps on it. For footwear, if your gonna be bivy hunting and packing a load every day go with a good boot with good ankle support..Light is nice when running around the hills but you need something strong for bivy hunting so you dont blow an ankle out. If your looking for new optics take the time to look at the Vortex line, they are hard to beat for the money. Heck of alot cheaper than Swarovski that's for sure but still have good glass in them.

D-If I were you I would really consider buying a pack frame from Cabelas, The Extreme Alaskan Outfitter Frame. This is what I use and it carries 125 pounds or more just fine. When you pack in for your 10 day hunt buy a Badlands 2800 or similar sized pack. Leave your pack frame at base camp and use the 2800 for everyday hunting. For the items you can't pack in the 2800 on the way in to base camp get a large OR compression sack that is waterproof and put it on the shelf of the pack frame and then put the 2800 on top of that. This is what I have done before and it works great.

An internal frame pack is comfortable like the 4500 but unless you want to keep the meat loads around 75 pounds you will be fighting the pack and loose the comfort. In my opinion this is where a pack frame really helps you out. I will be posting some pictures in blog soon of what I use for getting my meat out. Also consider that you will probably get ~250 pounds of meat if you bone it out.

Yeah it all depends on the weather, person and distance. But if you want to do it in two trips then figure on 110 pounds minimum. When you first shoot one you will bone it out into ~4 game bags. I usually try to pack out as much as I can that trip on my 2800 or the day pack you are using. Take out the backstrap and tenderloin as you will want to put these in a seperate game bag. These usually weigh around 30 pounds. Take more meat if you can. Then also take the rack. I would also suggest getting the small Wyoming saw. It has a wood blade and bone blade.

On a conditioning note. I use my pack frame and hike with 60lbs of weight or more on it to get into shape. Great way to break in some new boots and test out your pack. There is a huge difference in running legs and packing legs.

Do yourself a favor and look into the Eberlestock JP9 Blue Widow. I had the BL's 4500. It creaked like a sonabitch, zippers constantly broke, outter side pockets didn't fit nothing, 100oz bladder had to hang off the backpocket vs keeping it closer to my center of gravity along my back and never fit my torso right. I take it I got a lemon but enough was enough with that pack. I was a big fan until the 45 ruined it for me. I can tell you the BL's 2200 is a badass pack and I've packed out huge amounts of meat in it. The 4500 just didn't do it for me. The Eberle does the job of both of those packs, fits me better and I love the fact I can zip off the spike camp duffel and drop 10-15lbs of camp. It also hauled out elk and deer meat flawlessly for me this year. The Eberle can be very fined tuned in how you can make it fit you. I really like that I can keep my spotter and tripod hooked up and tucked away on the outside of the pack. I'd try a few to see what works best for you.

The JP9 Bluewidow is basically the Dragonfly minus the scabbard layer. I've heard complaints in the past of the pack hangin too far back because of that play in the older scabbard layers of packs like the J104/105. I think this new design alleviates any of those past issues. You can still put a scabbard in the pack. I don't do much gun huntin but it fits the 30/30 awesomely. You can see the buttstock about head level coming out of the pack. Here's a pic:

As far as toughness goes its all there. The zippers are allot tougher then those of the BL's from what I've seen. They don't get caught up anywhere near what I experienced with the old 4500 (07 model) also. 100+lb loads of meat is what she can easily do. The only limiting factor is my frame thus far. Polycarbonate is cool and all, but I honestly like being able to tweak the aluminum stays of the Eberle's and the 2200. The fanny with the JP9 is sweet too. It holds a 100oz Camelback bladder well. I killed my Lope with that on this year.

I did not know they had come out with the JP9, the scabbard and the whole 'weight too far out' thing is what drew my attention away to other packs. I do like the new setup without the scabbard and definetly the flexibility in different setups, with/without duffell etc.

The 7lb weight seems a little high as does the almost 7lb-13oz weight of the 4500... Much higher than the weights I am used to with regular backpacking packs, I have a kelty ultralight 3500 weighing in under 3.5 lbs. But then again I am positive it would be destroyed in about a week on a hunting trip.

The lightweight of the sitka pack intrigued me, but I have hearing that they grossly stated this (i.e. the pack without the

top or straps etc.)

We'll have to look into a little further... Maybe bring a scale into sportsmans wearhouse!

Well you got a couple choices... Use just the pack and strap your bivy/bag combo up under the chassis. Option 2 would be to stick it in the mesh meat area. You could also purchase the zipin panel that'll keep that area covered. Option 3 and my preference is sticking it in the spike camp duffel. I basically set that bad boy up with all of the sleeping / cooking needs. I always keep my Western Mountaineering Megalite stuffed in the ODR Advanced bivy than compress that in a small sack. It packs down pretty small. If I compressed the bivy and bag seperately, I could stuff one in each side pocket and keep the pack smaller. I just prefer it the way I do it now and use that area for other stuff. This thing is a Transformer, its awesome. Lots of flexibility with this bag... <http://eberlestock.com/JP9%20Blue%20Widow.htm> About half way down the link it runs you through some of the options.

I know they sell bigger shooters harness'(shoulder straps) and big boy waist kits (belts). There is a ton of adjustability in the torso adjustment as well. It was really nice to finally have a pack that fit my torso well. For me at 5'9", 43chest and 30 waist I always had a hard time getting the BL's to fit properly. This one fit very well once I screwed around with weight

in it and tweaked it out. Call the owner Glenn Eberle and he'll hook you up. I've spoken to him directly and he's always been more than helpfull over the phone. Goodl luck!

Thanks for the great advice guys...I will look into it. It just still bugs me how much these damn hunting packs weigh...seems like someone would have come up with a lighter way to be user-freindly than a 7+ pound pack... I am used to my (albeit smaller) 3.6lb kelty ultralight 3500... Anyone with trail backpacking experience... do you feel general backpacking packs just aren't built tough enough to handle the load? I don't think my Kelty could handle 70+lbs but there are others in the 4-5lb range that appear to be built tough enough too. Maybe hunting packs still have some evolving to do or the "jack of all trades" hunting pack mentality weighs it down.

I have done a lot of backpacking and thought the same thing. I think the main reason behind the weight in the Badland packs are due to the material they use. Compare this heavy weight material to a lightweight 500 denier Codura and you can have a difference of a few pounds. Another thing is the padding that Badlands uses. It is very dense and they don't use a mesh type of material with lighter weight padding behind it that breaths better and are just as comfortable in my opinion.

I am really surprised that a company hasn't come out with a pack that is lightweight like you are saying. The technology and materials are out there a company just has to put it all together.

I think it is what Sitka was trying to do but came up short a little bit. They used those better materials and tweek them for hunting, aka waterproof sections, spotting scope pouch etc. In think where they fell short was with the intial pack design/layout. Sitka stuck with the standard, what I call 'tube' pack and didn't offer some of the benefits of the extra pockets and layout of say a badlands or eberlestock pack. They got pretty close though... Thank You Sir, seems a bit small for anything over 5 days. I have a 3500 Kelty for general backpacking that I think I could go 6 or 7 days in tops but with the added hunting gear I think the Sitka might fall short for the 7 day requirement I have placed on the pack I am going to order. Then again, 3900 is more than 3500 and the added side pockets will take most of the other gear.

Geez, what a decision. I have checked them both out but keeping holding out in hopes of a miracle bag out there that weighs 3 lbs, holds 5000CI, has the most comfortable frame, is waterproof and walks and carries quarters on its own!

I pretty much have it narrowed down to the Badlands, JP9, and Sitka 45 with preference to the Sitka and Eberlestock.

How do you guys handle your food at night, I know the rules about hanging your pack, not cooking in the same clothes you are going sleep in etc, but talking to some of the folks at REI or other camping stores they swore by the bear cannisters (<http://www.rei.com/product/709075>) these seemed to be easier to manage than trying to hang your pack everynight however they add weight and bulk to the pack obviously. I was curious if anyone had thoughts/tips in this regard.

For reference I will be hunting on the Idaho/Montana border where black bears are the issue not brown/grizzly.

I think those bears are less of an issue than human habituated bears in National parks that most of the REI crowd frequents. Some NF here in CA require Bear cans but most folks won't take them unless required because of the weight and bulk. A 50 ft line to hang your pack is lighter and smaller.

Also a bear TAG is the best bear repellent around.
